*City parks get hefty grant*

■ Miami's parks will receive a hefty sum, thanks to the Bayfront Park Management Trust, led by executive director Tim Schmand. The one-time \$500,000 grant will be distributed among the city's five districts, giving each commissioner \$100,000 to improve programming at designated parks.

The funds will be used to enhance summer programs, after-school activities and programs for people with disabilities.

"As commissioners we have a commitment to the residents in our district to see that changes take place," said District 5 commissioner Michelle Spence-Jones during last month's discussion to approve the grant.

■ Brickell novelist David Pereda was awarded the Florida Writers Association's second-place prize in the 2006 Royal Palm Literary Awards for his forthcoming novel, "Beyond Midnight in America."

## Fathoms Below

*Underwater shipwrecks protected*

■ After almost five years of negotiations, two federal agencies are finally partnering to protect underwater shipwrecks and other submerged archaeological sites as cultural resources. Biscayne National Park and the Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary have agreed to work together to enhance social science research, resource protection, and public information and education surrounding submerged archaeological sites.

Hundreds of shipwrecks and many submerged archaeological sites are scattered underwater between the two areas, with dozens located along the 30 miles of shared jurisdictional boundary. With this collaboration, the agencies hope to reveal the stories of a common maritime heritage. Similar agreements exist between the two agencies for protecting sea grass, coral and other natural resources.

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
